A few weeks ago when the Band were at Staines, Tim Bessex reminded us of the Parable of the Starfish. He spoke to us about how we can all make a difference. I have also used it many times at work when training new volunteers to make them aware of the significance of the time they give to St Peter's Hospice. There are many versions of it, but here is one:

The Parable of the Starfish. One day, an old man was walking along a beach that was littered with thousands of starfish that had been washed ashore by the high tide. As he walked he came upon a young boy who was eagerly throwing the starfish back into the ocean, one by one. Puzzled, the man looked at the boy and asked what he was doing. Without looking up from his task, the boy simply replied, "*I'm saving these starfish, Sir*". The old man chuckled aloud, "*Son, there are thousands of starfish and only one of you. What difference can you make?*" The boy picked up a starfish, gently tossed it into the water and turning to the man, said, "***I made a difference to that one!***"



We too can make a difference to the lives of other people. Sometimes this will be a very deliberate & intended action on our part, but very often it will be when we are unaware we are making a specific difference – by the way we act, by the way we speak. Particularly this Christmas, we may be unaware of the impact our music can have as we portray the real meaning of Christmas. I have a reputation at carolling for insisting we only play real carols, for I believe that could be the moment that our playing of the real meaning of Christmas could make a difference to the life of that person stood listening.

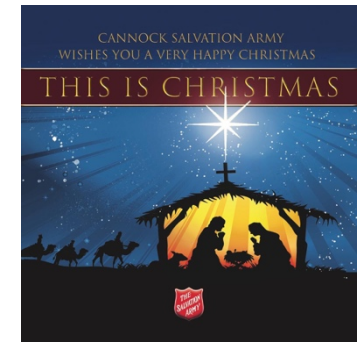
