Major's Musings

Dear friends,

During the divisional officer's retreat in February we were asked to lead prayers on one of the mornings. In my research for this I came across the following story:

I Had a Dream. I dreamed I had an interview with God... "Come in," God said. "So, you would like to interview Me?" "If you have the time," I said. God smiled and said: "My time is eternity and is enough to do everything; what questions do you have in mind to ask me?"

"What surprises you most about mankind?"

God answered: "That they get bored of being children, are in a rush to grow up, and then long to be children again. That they lose their health to make money and then lose their money to restore their health. That by thinking anxiously about the future, they forget the present, such that they live neither for the present nor the future. That they live as if they will never die, and they die as if they had never lived..."

God took my hands and we were silent for while and then I asked...
"As a parent, what are some of life's lessons you want your children to learn?"

God replied with a smile: "To learn that they cannot make anyone love them. What they can do is to let themselves be loved. To learn that what is most valuable is not what they have in their lives, but who they have in their lives. To learn that it is not good to compare themselves to others. All will be judged individually on their own merits, not as a group on a comparison basis! To learn that a rich person is not the one who has the most, but is one who needs the least. not always enough that they be forgiven by others, but that they have to forgive themselves."

I sat there for a while enjoying the moment. I thanked Him for his time and for all that He has done for me and my family, and He replied, "Anytime. I'm here 24 hours a day. All you have to do is ask for me, and I will answer." With that, He looked into my eyes and whispered these words: "My dear child, please remember that people will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel."

Forgiveness

The spiritual life is about quality not quantity, sadly we are in a movement that has been good at counting numbers but not so good at measuring quality outcomes. I pray that our focussing in on the cross and what it is saying to us will give us a way forward to measuring quality not just quantity. During the exercise that we carried our recently one of the words that appeared on almost everyone's list was 'forgiveness' but what does it mean to forgive?

How do we respond when somebody fails or falters in their walk with the Lord? In the past the history of The Salvation Army and the church in general has been a very legalistic and sanction led approach. Looking at Jesus' response on the cross to the penitent criminal would suggest that this approach is possibly not always the way that we should respond to each other. Neither should it be that we ignore the fact that there are consequences to our actions and sometimes we have to live with the consequences even though we have been forgiven. Any parent will, probably, be able recount stories of where forgiveness and consequential outcomes have been held in tension and the chord holding them was love.

We must constantly remind ourselves that it whilst we were still sinners that Christ died for us. His love was so great that he not only forgave but he took the consequences for our disobedience upon himself. It may not be possible for us to always follow this example to the point that Christ did but there could be times when forgiveness will lead to a costly outcome for the aggrieved person on behalf of the aggressor. If Christ forgave me and went to the cross for me just what does forgiveness of others demand of me? This is a personal question for each and every one of us but one that must be addressed if we are to have a quality marker for us a corporate body of the church.

There are a number of helpful passages of Scripture that might help us in this quest for truth.

Matthew 6:12-15

And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one. For if you forgive

other people when they sin against you, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive others their sins, your Father will not forgive your sins. (NIV)

Matthew 26:28

This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins. (NIV)

Luke 6:37

Do not judge, and you will not be judged. Do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven. (NIV)

Luke 17:3

So watch yourselves. "If your brother or sister sins against you, rebuke them; and if they repent, forgive them." (NIV)

Luke 23:34

Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." And they divided up his clothes by casting lots. (NIV)

1 John 2:12

I am writing to you, dear children, because your sins have been forgiven on account of his name. (NIV)

Acts 2:38

Peter replied, "Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. And you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." (NIV)

Acts 10:43

All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name. (NIV)

Ephesians 1:7

In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace. (NIV)

Colossians 2:13

When you were dead in your sins and in the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made you alive with Christ. He forgave us all our sins... (NIV)

Colossians 3:13

Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. (NIV)

Hebrews 8:12

For I will forgive their wickedness and will remember their sins no more. (NIV)

1 John 1:9

If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness. (NIV)

Lewis B. Smedes wrote in his book, *Forgive and Forget*, "When you release the wrongdoer from the wrong, you cut a malignant tumor out of your inner life. You set a prisoner free, but you discover that the real prisoner was yourself."

The big question for us is 'How do we show forgiveness in all aspects of our being?' Putting it another way, How do we, 'Sinners saved by Grace' respond to others for whom Christ equally died but as yet have not accepted his love and forgiveness? John 11:35 recounts a response from Jesus as it reveals that on seeing Jerusalem he wept. He was then to go into the city to pay the price that forgiveness demanded of him. What is forgiveness demanding of you, this corps, each section individually?

BUILDING FUND

Almost 6 years ago now, we moved back into our suite of buildings at Staple Hill following a major refurbishment that cost just short of one million pounds - made possible, in part, through a £200,000 loan from our Divisional Headquarters. At the end of January of this year, we were able to repay another £15,000 to DHQ which now brings the outstanding balance of the loan to a mere £40,000 and I am starting to feel that the end is in sight. Hopefully, another 3 years and the loan will have been fully repaid! Much of this has been made possible through the Gift-Aid scheme. To put this into perspective, we received approximately £11,500 in Gift-Aid at the end of last year relating to our claim for the 2011/12 tax year, and there is a similar amount expected from the 2012/13 tax year. Most of this money is put towards repaying the building loan. Basically, the scheme enables us to claim from the government an extra 25p for every £1 donated, providing the donor has an income to pay an equivalent amount of income tax and he/she has signed a simple declaration to enable us to make the claim. If you would like further information, or your circumstances have changed since you signed the declaration (e.g. you no longer pay income tax), then please let me know.

OTHER DONATIONS

Following the spectacular giving seen over the Christmas period during our carol playing, we have been able to forward £3,454.53 to the Salvation Army's work at LOGOS house in the centre of Bristol – now known as a *Lifehouse*. This is the Salvation Army run centre for homelessness in Bristol that gives short-term housing for up to 93 homeless people every night with follow-on support to find a more permanent housing solution. It also provides detox

services to help men and women break free from alcohol and drug addictions, together with all-important counselling services.

FAST BANKING

The corps is now set up with a fast banking facility. This means that we can now arrange the payment of bills and expenses direct into the recipient's bank account rather than via cheques – saving both time and the cost associated with processing cheques. If you regularly require cheques to reimburse expenses, then we would be happy to set-up a template for you to allow 'fast banking' of any future payments.

GIVING ENVELOPES

Over the coming few weeks I shall be preparing and distributing the new sets of giving envelopes. When you receive these, you may notice that the number printed on the envelope will have changed. This is intentional as I am taking the opportunity this year to reallocate all the numbers in order to eliminate gaps in the numbering system that slowly accumulate over time as people change their method of giving or move away from the corps. The numbering will be in alphabetical order of surname based on the method of giving: weekly envelope, monthly envelope or monthly standing order. If you ever want to change the way you give your regular tithes and offerings then again, just have a chat to me.
